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Introduction

f a man owns a hundred sheep, and one of them wanders away, will he not leave the ninety-nine on the hills and go to look for the one that wandered off? And if he finds it, I tell you the truth, he is happier about that one sheep than about the ninety-nine that did not wander off. In the same way your Father in heaven is not willing that any of these little ones should be lost.

What an enormous responsibility! But, also, what an exciting opportunity! An opportunity to shepherd the pre-schoolers of your church, community or family into Jesus' fold, an opportunity to teach them of Jesus' love and an opportunity to show them Jesus' world.

This guide is to assist parents who want their children to be part of a larger family as they develop physically and spiritually. The Little Lamb program can be organized as part of the Adventurer Club or Eager Beaver Program in your church or by a group of parents who want to use a curriculum to help them teach their children skills and values.

Little Lamb activities should be fun and kid centered. Remember that children of this age look to adults to set the pace of the meetings and model how they should respond to situations. So . . . take a deep breath, say a prayer, and keep your sense of humor. Your adventures with Little Lambs are about to begin!





The Little Lamb Program

This section contains an overview of the Little Lamb program. You'll get an idea of where Little Lambs fit into Children's and Youth Ministries and the goals and requirements of the Little Lamb program.



Age Levels of Seventh-day Adventist Youth Programs

Little Lambs are part of the Seventh-day Adventist Church's Youth Ministries. The Little Lambs and Eager Beavers are part of the Adventurer Club. Once children graduate from Adventurers they join Pathfinders. While Little Lambs and Eager Beavers are unique to the North American Division of the Seventh-day Adventist church, Adventures and Pathfinders can be found worldwide with a membership of more than 2.5 million boys and girls.













Little Lamb Program Goals

As the club leader, you will find it helpful to keep the following goals in mind as you plan, conduct and evaluate each meeting.

ONE

Demonstrate God's love for children.

TWO

Promote the values expressed in the Little Lamb pledge and song.

THREE

Create an environment where all children can contribute.

FOUR

Encourage children to have fun.





Little Lamb Pledge

Jesus loves me, and I want to do my best for Him.

Little Lamb Song

I'm a little lamb today; Jesus is my Shepherd. My Shepherd loves me day to day; Jesus is my Shepherd. I will follow where He leads: He gives me everything I need; I'm a little lamb today; Jesus is my Shepherd.

Program Requirements n' Mascot

ne of your responsibilities as leader is to encourage the physical, mental and spiritual development of each child. The Little Lamb program requirements were created to assist you with this responsibility. The requirements are organized into five areas: Little Lamb Program Requirements, My God, My World, My Family and Myself. Each child will complete most of the program requirements as part of the Little Lamb meetings (page 176). The completion of each requirement will be noted in the lesson so you can put a star or sticker by the child's name on the Little Lamb Record Chart (page 177). At the end of the Little Lamb year, each child completing all the requirements will receive the Little Lamb pin (see Investiture Program on page 170).

It is very important for you to remember that not all children in Little Lambs will be at the same developmental level or have the same physical abilities, so you'll need to be flexible in how the children complete these requirements. It is up to you to interpret how the children fulfill these requirements. For example, some children will not be able to remember all of the words to the Little Lamb pledge, but they can learn to stand with their hand over their heart during the pledge. Flexibility and creativity are the keys to ensuring the success of each Little Lamb. As always, these activities should be fun for you and the children.










Little Lamb Puzzle Patch

Little Lamb patches are called Stars. There are thirteen Stars designed to encourage the children in your club to explore, learn and play. Once a child has completed the activities for an individual patch, he or she has earned a Star. Children this age need immediate rewards, so give them the Stars at the end of the meeting when the patch is completed.

It is important for leaders to note that the requirements for all eight Stars and all of the Program Requirements are built into the Little Lamb meetings. To keep track just mark off the requirement on the Star Requirement Record Charts (pages 185-197) for the Star once it's been done. Once all of the requirements for a Star are completed, you can put a star or sticker by each child's name on the Little Lamb Record Charts (pages 185-197).



Star activities should ideally be done as part of the Little Lamb meeting. However, they can also be done outside of the meetings with the child's parent(s), other significant adult or older sibling. When working on Stars, it is up to the leader to adapt the requirements to the club and the children's needs. For example, the Community Helpers Star requires the child to play an action game using community helper's skills. As leader, you might choose to watch a video or visit a community helper.

It is also up to you, the leader, to decide when a child has met the intent of the honor. Remember that not all children will be capable of completing all Star and Program Requirements as written. It's more important that the children are encouraged to try new things and have fun, rather than competing with each other to receive the most Stars or becoming frustrated by requirements that are beyond their abilities. Flexibility on your part will make the experience more enjoyable and positive for the children.



Characteristics of Little Lambs

This section gives you and your staff a quick overview of what to expect from Little Lambs.



What You Need to Know About Little Lambs

n the book *Child Guidance* (2004), Ellen White encourages parents to understand the developmental needs of their children. This section helps you with just that—understanding the physical, cognitive and social characteristics of Little Lambs. Remember that children develop at their own pace, so some children in your club may not have reached these markers, and others will have passed them. Make sure you focus on the specific needs of each child and not the stages.

Developmental Characteristics

LITTLE LAMBS

- Learn through play
- Have short attention spans
- Obey rules, but do not understand right and wrong
- Can follow two unrelated simple directions
- Understand danger and may develop fears
- Experience mood swings, but tantrums generally don't last long
- Know six to eight colors
- Understand concepts such as size and shapes
- Like to do things for themselves but are reassured when an adult is nearby for help

Large Motor Skills

LITTLE LAMBS

- Run and climb easily
- Are still learning to skip, catch a bounced ball, walk a straight line, hop on one foot and kick a ball
- Throw overhand
- Use large arm movements for writing and drawing

Fine Motor Skills

LITTLE LAMBS

- Dress themselves but may need assistance with zippers, buckles and buttons
- Can hold a pencil, draw a circle and a face
- Can trace outlines of simple shapes
- Can uses safety scissors to cut a line
- Build block structures with 10 blocks
- Can complete simple 4 to 12 piece puzzles

Speech Development

LITTLE LAMBS

- Ask lots of questions
- Enjoy telling stories
- Like to say silly words and rhymes and to shock with forbidden words
- Like to sing

Social Skills

LITTLE LAMBS

- Often share when asked
- May have imaginary playmates
- Like to explore the body
- Begin to play with others in a group
- May be bossy
- Change the rules to games
- Sometimes lie to protect friends or themselves
- Can be aggressive but want friends







Children with Special Needs

Learn how every Little Lamb can fully participate in your group by understanding each child and knowing how to plan inclusive activities.



Including Children With Special Needs

When you learn that a child with a disability will be a member of your club, you might initially feel overwhelmed. Don't worry. Often simple changes to an activity or requirement are all that is needed. Remember that parents or guardians are not looking to you to discredit a diagnosis or to offer a "cure" for a condition, rather they are looking to you to welcome and include their child. Additionally, the other children and adults look to you to see how to act, so make sure you treat the child with special needs with the same openness and ease that you show all of the children. And one more thing: Little Lambs may be afraid that they will "catch" the disability. Reassure them that this won't happen.



Do's

- Speak directly to the child, not to the adult.
- Recognize that a child's physical disabilities don't indicate mental disabilities.
- Find out medical or special equipment needs of the child.
- Explain special equipment to all children to alleviate fears.
- Take extra care in planning for the safety of the child with special needs.
- Ensure the meeting facility is handicapped accessible.
- Ask the child the best way for her to do something.
- Permit children to ask the child with special needs about the disability.
- Foster independence.
- Focus on all children's strengths.
- Expect reasonable behavior from all children.
- Be flexible.

Planning Inclusive Activities

At times you will need to substitute or change program requirements in order for children with special needs to participate. However, this may mean some creative thinking on your part. Remember that the point is for the activity to be fun and meaningful for the child. Here are some ideas to get you started.


- For the child with autism unable to join in dramatic play about neighborhood helpers, try showing the child pictures of a neighborhood helper. Then model dressing up like the helper. Finally, give the child the opportunity to dress up, but don't force him.
- For the child with developmental delays who may be lagging behind in talking, let her hold the flag during the Little Lamb pledge instead of reciting it.
- For the child with a developmental disability (i.e. Down Syndrome), give directions one step at a time and model the action.

 For the deaf child, teach him and the other children the American Sign Language signs to "Jesus is My Shepherd." This works for children with speech language disabilities,


Guidelines for Leaders

Successful leaders understand how to communicate
with their Little Lambs and are intentional
in planning programs and trips.
Here are some tips on being a great leader.

Little Lamb leaders do it all, but they shouldn't do it all by themselves! Successful Little Lamb groups involve the parents or guardians of all the children in a leadership or staff position at each meeting. Here are some additional tips for being a successful leader.

Ideas for Connecting with Little Lambs

- Try to be at the children's eye level by sitting or kneeling.
- Know each child's name and use it.
- Let the children know you enjoy being with them.
- Give each child opportunities to use his or her strengths.
- Give specific directions. Ask the children to put the crayons in the box. Don't say "clean up."
- Give specific choices only when choices are an option. Ask a disruptive child if she would you like to play Duck, Duck, Goose or sit with Mr. Martinez and read a book.
- Use clear, simple words.
- Vary the pace of activities and have activities ready for children that finish early.
- Give a five-minute warning, then a two-minute warning to help children transition to the next activity.
- Never be sarcastic.
- Correct or discipline children quietly and unobtrusively.
- Be near the children when talking to them; don't yell from across the room.
- Ignore inappropriate behavior, when possible.
- Acknowledge good behavior at every opportunity.
- Create a discipline plan ahead of time and share it with the parents/guardians.
- Have three to five simple rules and make sure all of the children know them.



More on Leadership

Leadership is more than working with the children. It involves communicating the mission, recruiting staff, planning the program and ensuring the safety of the children entrusted to your care. Here are the basics.

Recruiting Adult Volunteers

The place to start is with the parents or guardians of your Little Lambs. Every adult involved should fill out the Staff/Volunteer Service Information Form (page 182). In addition to parents, you will need to recruit volunteers to help you with the Little Lamb program. Each activity will require a significant amount of adult interaction and having enough adults is the key. There are adults in your church and community that would love to be part of your Little Lamb program. Don't forget to include:

- Youth
- College students
- Adults that don't have children
- Grandparents (their grandchildren may be in Little Lambs!)

These people may not be able to make a year-long commitment but would be willing to assist in a specific program or craft.

Here are some keys to recruiting volunteers:

- Start early.
- Pray for guidance in finding the right people for this ministry.
- Create a "prospect list."
- Have a clear description of each job.
- Share the recruiting responsibilities with other leaders/staff. They have a different network!
- Regularly share information about what Little Lambs are doing with your congregation and invite people who are interested to contact you.





Job Descriptions

PROGRAM COORDINATOR

- Schedules the Little Lamb program; coordinates dates, times and facilities with the church calendar and other ministries.
- Coordinates with the Adventurer Club and Eager Beaver leaders if the Little Lamb program is part of the club.
- Recruits, trains and oversees volunteers by providing materials and facilitating communication within the program.

FACILITY AND OFF-SITE ACTIVITY DIRECTOR

- Prepares the location where the program will take place by setting up the room(s) and needed equipment as outlined in the lesson.
- Works with the Coordinator to identify dates and coordinates all logistics (transportation, etc.) for any off-site activities.



- Assists the Program Coordinator with recruiting volunteers.
- Provides all the materials needed for the lesson.
- Prepares and then leads a group of team members to assist in each lesson's activities.

MEETING TEAM MEMBER

- Assists with the activities at each meeting.
- Takes on a specific part of the meeting.
- Works to build positive relationships with the Adventure Club and Eager Beaver Program leaders.

SECRETARY/TREASURER

- Keeps a list of all Little Lambs' names and parents' or guardians' contact information.
- Records attendance.
- Maintains the master record of completion of Program Requirements, Star Requirements and Stars given to Little Lambs.







- Records payment of dues.
- Approves all receipts for reimbursement.

Publicity Ideas

Once you have a Little Lamb Program going, you may not need a great deal of publicity. But if your program is just getting started, you will need to let the people in your church and community know how great it is to be a Little Lamb. Here are some ideas:

- Post signs with the Little Lamb logo and give five reasons to join.
- Visit Sabbath School classes of preschool-age children.
- See if you can send a note out to parents at local day care centers.
- Put information on your church's website.
- Decorate a booth or table in the church lobby. (Make sure you have adult volunteer information available!)
- Arrange to give an announcement at church and have some children involved.
- Do a countdown to the first meeting in the church bulletin or on a bulletin board in the lobby of your church.

Planning a Calendar

The Little Lamb Program is very flexible in its ability to adapt to the schedule that will work best for your church and community. You have the option of meeting once a month or twice a month, and you will also need to decide if your group will meet during the summer and what you want to do during holiday seasons.

On pages 169-170 you will find ideas for Induction (beginning of the program year) and Investiture (end of the program year).

As you review the Scope and Sequence of the meetings, (pages 36-40) you will see that there is a meeting for each Star and two meetings for most of the Program Requirements. You can pick and choose which meeting plans you use and in what order they are used.

Safety

Ensuring the safety of each child is a priority of the Little Lamb leader. To help you with this, safety guidelines have been adapted from Adventist Risk Management's guidelines for Pathfinder leaders. For a complete list of safety guidelines, please contact Adventist Risk Management directly at 12501 Old Columbia Pike, Silver Spring, MD 20904, 301.680.6930 or on the web at www.adventistrisk.org. You should also ask your Church Board for any additional guidelines and policies specific to your local conference and church.

PLANNING

Planning is key to safety. Many injuries and losses during programs, field trips or outings result from failures in planning for the activity. Adventist Risk Management provides a Trip Planner to assist you in determining some of the equipment, supervisory, transportation and other elements that might be needed for a Little Lamb field trip or outing (page 178).


Here are some helpful suggestions:

- Start the year with a planning session with your staff.
- Assign a staff person to be responsible for completing a Trip Planner for each outing.
- Plan ahead and don't wait until the last minute.
- Visit off-site locations before the activity to determine hazards and risks.

RISK LEVELS AND REQUIRED SUPERVISION

Consider the following when assessing risk levels:

- Instructors' qualifications and experience.
- Type of activity (inherent risks).
- Number of participants.
- Location of activity.
- Condition of equipment.
- Allotted time for activity.
- Make sure that proper insurance coverage has been obtained.



SUPERVISION

Supervision for all activities must be done by qualified staff. Maintaining an adequate staff/child ratio is critical for safety. Here are some recommendations:

- High risk activities one staff to four children
- Mild risk activities one staff to six children
- Low risk activities one staff to ten children

Volunteer Screening

Volunteers should be interviewed as though they were applying for a paid position. Each volunteer wishing to work with children must have been a church member for at least six months prior to application, provide current references, and they may be asked to submit to a background check. If a criminal background check is going to be done, then consent must be obtained. A Volunteer Screening Form is available on page 182. This is a template that gives suggestions of what information should be gathered. Since every state has different requirements for adults working with children, please follow the procedure for volunteer screening that is outlined by your church and conference. In addition to the screening process, all names of volunteers for children's ministries positions should be announced in the church bulletin. For more information on volunteer screening, go to www.adventistrisk.org.

Protecting Against Abuse and Sexual Molestation

Leaders must follow some basic guidelines to ensure that their Little Lambs are not exposed to sexual predators or put in a position where they could be abused. Here are some ground rules:

- Each activity should have at least one registered adult leader 21 years old or older and another adult, 18 years old or older.
- No private one-on-one contact is allowed.
- Respect each child's privacy.
- No secret organizations are allowed.
- Appropriate attire should be worn.
- Discipline should be constructive; this means no spanking or hitting.
- Hazing and initiations are prohibited.
- Harmful or hurtful teasing is prohibited.
- Junior leader training should be provided for older children assisting with the program.
- Conduct activities in rooms which have easy visible access to the children.

Permission Form/ Medical Release

The leader must bring mandatory parental or guardian permission forms to all offsite activities. This includes forms for the leader's children, staff's children and children whose parents are part of the trip or outing. You will find a sample permission form on page 184.



Here are some tips that will make sure you have everything covered:

- Permission forms should include details regarding food and drug allergies.
- Permission forms should be securely filed.
- Parents must be informed of specific activities.
- Always have a copy of the child's medical release form with the leader during all off-site activities.
- In the event of an emergency, reasonable effort must be made to contact parents or guardians.
- Little Lamb Health Records Forms should be provided to the staff on a need-to-know basis and be kept confidential accordance with HIPPA requirements.

Transportation



Taking groups of children on an outing significantly increases the chance of some type of incident. One of the keys to safety is paying close attention to the arrangements for transportation. Here are some important issues:

- Vehicles must be insured in compliance with local state laws.
- Vehicles should be inspected prior to use to determine road worthiness.
- Drivers must be at least 21 years of age.
- Drivers shall have an acceptable driving record with not more than two traffic citations and no at-fault accidents while driving any vehicle.
- Riders must not exceed seatbelt and seating capacity.
- Gross vehicle and tire weights are not to be exceeded.
- Open vehicles should not be used to transport children.







Meeting Room & Surrounding Premises

Whether you meet in your church basement, a fellowship hall, the gym or an off-site facility, care should be taken to ensure the safety of your Little Lambs. Before each meeting or activity, a leader should be assigned to inspect the premises for hazards, including the following:

- Clutter
- Combustibles near fire
- Broken glass
- Inadequate lighting
- Exposed electrical outlets
- Trip hazards
- Guns, explosives and knives should be prohibited at the meeting facility and club activities

Equipment

Making wise choices in equipment purchased and taking good care of what you have are both keys to equipment safety. Carefully inspect equipment before each activity. Don't keep faulty or broken equipment and dispose of it right away. The last safety tip on equipment is to ensure that proper equipment is used for each activity. Using equipment improperly is just as dangerous as using broken equipment.

In the Event of an Accident

During your staff planning session at the beginning of the year, written procedures should be developed for all types of emergencies: accidents, medical, fires, and natural disasters. These should be reviewed with the staff periodically to make sure that everyone understands the emergency procedures.



Uniforms & Insignia

Being part of a winning team is important to children as they develop self-esteem. Uniforms and insignia are visible ways to be team.



he uniform makes the organization real and visible to the Little Lambs, the church and community. When children wear the uniform, they know they are part of a group and they are proud to wear the same uniform as their adult leaders.

Uniforms should be worn for the following occasions:

- Regular meetings (as designated by leaders)
- Special programs (Induction, Investiture, when involved in any church program)
- Any community outreach projects (nursing home visits, food basket distribution, Ingathering)
- Occasions the staff designate

Leaders have two options for their Little Lamb uniform. The first is the full dress uniform used by Adventurers with the Little Lamb scarf, slide and patch. Full dress uniform requires black belt and black shoes. The other option is the Little Lamb t-shirt with the scarf, slide (scarf holder) and sash for Stars.

Full Dress Uniform



GIRLS

- Navy blue pleated jumper
- Light blue blouse (Peter Pan collar with short sleeves)
- Optional: white blouse



BOYS

- Navy blue pants
- Light blue shirt (regular collar with short sleeves)
- Optional: white shirt





- Navy blue skirt
- White uniform-style blouse (short sleeve or long sleeve)
- Navy blue tie



MEN

- Navy blue slacks
- White uniform style shirt (short sleeve or long sleeve)
- Navy blue tie



SCARF AND SLIDE

The Little Lamb scarf is available in both child and adult sizes. Staff members who are Master Guides may wear their Master Guide scarf and slide.



SASH

Little Lambs wear a navy blue sash that they can use to display their Stars. They will continue to use this same sash when moving to Eager Beavers.



THE PIN

The Little Lamb pin should be presented to the child at Investiture to signify the successful fulfillment of the Little Lamb Requirements.

The following illustrations are to assist you in correctly placing the Little Lamb insignia on the uniform.



RIGHT SLEEVE

- 1/2" down from shoulder: place the club name crescent.
- 2" down from the top of the club name crescent: place the Little Lamb patch.



LEFT SLEEVE

 2" down from the shoulder: place the Adventurer World patch.




SASH

 Little Lamb Stars are placed on the navy sash used in Adventurer Clubs.

Optional Uniform

Individual clubs have the option of purchasing the Little Lamb t-shirt or working with a local screen printing company to create their own personalized t-shirt design. The scarf and sash are worn over the t-shirt just as they are on the full dress uniform.





Little Lambs Learning & Playing

These meetings let your Little Lambs frolic and play while participating in fun educational activities.

Little Lamb Meetings

he Little Lamb Program includes 20 meeting plans plus ideas for Induction and Investiture. The meetings are the core of your program; this is where things really happen! Each meeting includes the following:

- A meeting theme
- Resources specific to each meeting
- Stories, crafts, games, and songs to support each theme
- Materials needed for the activities

Meeting Themes and Activity Tips

Little Lamb meetings should be planned to meet your church's mission, your program's goals, and, most importantly, the children's needs. With this in mind, the meetings provided in this section are designed to be flexible. Don't feel like you have to replicate them exactly as presented, although you can. Instead, adapt the meeting themes and activities to best suit your program by changing the order of the meetings, combining, deleting and adding activities, or by using them as inspiration for creating your own meetings.

While all of the activities in this section to maximize fun, they also lead the children to Jesus and enable them to learn about their world, their families and themselves. You can intentionally assist the children in recognizing these connections to Jesus and their world by specifically stating the purpose of the meeting, connecting the activities to the meeting theme and asking the children questions that encourage them to summarize what they've learned.

To help you do this, each meeting begins with a story based on the meeting's theme and includes book suggestions that you can find at your local library.

However, if you can't find the suggested titles, visit with the librarian for additional suggestions. Reading aloud to children introduces them to the rhythm of language, builds vocabulary and increases reading readiness. It's also a great way to introduce them to the meeting theme. Please note that the majority of the suggested books are not by Adventist publishers, so occasionally you may need to "edit" the story when reading it to the children to ensure that it meets your club's needs.



Tips for Making Story Time Fun

- Allow the children time to settle down.
- Sit in a low chair or on the floor, so you can be at eye-level with the children.
- Introduce the book—Show the cover, ask the children what they think the story is about, point to and tell them the title and the author's name.
- Read with expression and vary the pace.
- Don't read too fast.
- Pause to make sure all of the children have seen the pictures.
- Point to characters and objects; ask what they think will happen next.
- Have the children say repetitive phrases with you.
- After the story, wait a minute and give the children time to make comments or ask questions.

After each story, you'll find activities that go along with the story's theme and fulfill the Little Lamb Program Requirements.

You may want to present the activities as Learning Centers which encourage children to explore and learn by doing and develop independence and social skills. At the Learning Centers the children should be free to explore and use the resources provided in a variety of ways. Learning Centers also allow you to provide activities that meet the developmental needs and learning styles of all children. But if Learning Centers don't



work for your group, go ahead and present the material as best suits your needs.

Sample Dramatic Play Learning Center

Title: Camping Out

Skills Learned: Social and Language

Put up real tents or create tents out of sheets. Place sleeping bags and flashlights in the tents. Create a "camp fire" with small branches, fill a large tub with water, provide fishing poles (no hooks!), cover a table with a sheet or plastic table cloth to use as a picnic table, and set out metal pots, pans, plates and flatware. Compasses, binoculars and backpacks are also fun props. Encourage the children to explore and play with the props.

Whatever themes and activities you select, consider using the same organizational structure for each Little Lamb meeting, since children this age benefit from consistency and repetition. You'll notice that each of the meetings included in this section begins with an opening ceremony, followed by a theme story and activities and ends with a closing ceremony. This repetition of structure helps the children to know what to expect and how to act throughout the meeting.

Additionally, in the opening sidebar, you'll notice that the program or Star requirements met during the meeting are listed. At times, the activities may vary from the actual requirements. However, all suggested activities honor the intent of the requirements. It's up to you, as the leader, to decide how and if requirements are met.

Also, be aware that even though each activity includes an estimated time, the pace of activities will differ from club to club and meeting to meeting. Sometimes the children will quickly complete everything you planned. It's a good ideas to have a back-up game or activity for when this happens. Other times, the children may really enjoy an activity and not want to stop. It's okay to omit activities that you've planned and continue with something that everyone is enjoying. And if something isn't going smoothly, you can stop the activity and redirect the children to something new.

Besides back-up activities, you may want to plan on pre- and post-meeting activities to keep children that arrive early or stay late busy. If the pre-meeting activities are located in the same place at each meeting, the children will know exactly where to go and what to do when they arrive. These activities should generally be something the children can do independently, such as coloring, drawing, or assembling puzzles.

Finally, flexibility and enthusiasm are the keys to conducting successful Little Lamb meetings.

Ask the children if they know the names of various baby animals. You can begin by showing them pictures of the baby animals and then saying the names. She can pretend to be Mary and ask the children with lamb puppets why they followed her to school. The adult should continue to engage the children until they become comfortable playing on their own with the puppets.



ROLE PLAYING

Time: 15 Minutes

Meets requirement 5 for My God Program Requirements

Before the Meeting

Setup tents or make tents out of sheets/blankets. Have pillows and blankets inside of the tent and sheep (stuffed animals, plastic toy lambs) outside around the tent. Create a pretend campfire out of sticks and provide bowls, spoons, and pans and other

cooking utensils. Make robes from oversize t-shirts, head scarves from pillowcases and jute or ribbon to hold the scarves on to the children's heads.

Directions

Explain to the children that when Jesus lived on Earth, shepherds lived in tents, cooked over a fire, dressed in robes, went barefoot or wore sandals. Then encourage the children to take off their shoes and socks, dress-up in the clothes, and pretend to cook or watch over the sheep.

- Cooking utensils (bowls, spoons, pots)
- Large t-shirts, pillow cases, jute or ribbon





The Shepherd Says — #2 Lamb Frolic

GAME ACTIVITY

Time: 15 Minutes

Doesn't meet a requirement, but it's fun!

Directions

Materials Needed

Chalk or masking tape





This game is Simon Says renamed The Shepherd Says. The object of this game is to be a good listener and be the first to reach the little lamb. Begin by using the lamb puppet to explain to the children that the little lamb is lost and that they are going to help the shepherd find it. Then have the children stand behind a line that you have drawn with chalk or masking tape. (To keep the children from crowding each other, have them reach both arms out straight from their sides and tell them that they shouldn't be able to touch the boy or girl standing on either side of them.) Now take the lamb puppet and stand several feet in front of the children and tell the children the rules of the game.



The Shepherd Says Rules: An adult calls out a child's name and tells him or her how many and what kind of steps to take. For example, "Zachary, the shepherd says, take two giant steps." Zachary would then take two big steps toward the adult holding the lamb puppet. However, if the adult says, "Zachary, take two giant steps," but doesn't say the shepherd says, Zachary shouldn't take any steps. If he does, he goes back and stands behind the line.

(Demonstrating the game first with a couple of adults is helpful.) Types of commands to give the children to take might include giant steps, baby steps, backward steps or hops.

Lost Lamb Painting — #3 Lamb Frolic

ART CENTER

Time: 10 Minutes

Meets requirements 4 and 5 for My God Program Requirements

Before the Meeting

Using a white crayon, draw or trace a lamb onto white construction paper. Then use the white crayon to color in the lamb outline. Use water to thin the tempera paint. (It should be the consistency of milk.) And place the paint in small dishes. Additionally, you may want to cover the surface where the children will be painting with newspaper and provide old shirts for the children to wear.

Materials Needed

- White crayon
- White construction paper
- 1 inch paint brushes
- Light colored tempera paint (i.e., pale yellow or blue)
- Small containers to hold tempera paint
- Pictures of shepherds
- Paste
- Crayons
- Blow dryer
- Newspaper
- Old shirts to use as smocks





Directions

Ask the children what a shepherd does if a lamb is lost. Then tell them that a lamb is lost and they are going to help find it. Give each child a sheet of white construction paper with a lamb crayon drawing it. Then with a one inch paint brush, have them cover the paper with the paint.

Once the paint has dried (use a blow dryer to speed up the drying time), give each child a picture of a shepherd to glue on to their picture and crayons to decorate the pictures anyway they wish.



Materials Needed

Baby Bottle

Little Lamb, Little Lamb, Who's Got Your Bottle — #4 Lamb Frolic

CALL AND RESPONSE GAME

Time: 10 Minutes

Doesn't meet a requirement, but it's another fun lamb activity!

Directions

If you've ever played **Doggy**, **Doggy**, **Who's Got Your Bone**, you'll recognize this game. Have the children sit on the floor in a semi-circle. Then pretend to feed the lamb puppet with a baby bottle and explain that sometimes a lamb's mother can't feed (nurse) her lambs. If this happens, the shepherd helps out by feeding the lambs with baby bottles. Select one child to be the shepherd sitting at the open end of the circle with her back to the other children and place a baby bottle behind her back. Then point to one of the children in the semi-circle and have him quietly get the bottle, return to his spot in the semi-circle and place it behind his back. Once one of the children has hidden the bottle, have all of the children in the semi-circle bleat (baa, baa, baa). Now tell the child selected to be the shepherd that when she hears the lambs crying for their bottle to turn

around and guess who took the bottle. Repeat until all of the children have had a turn to be the shepherd.



Good-baa Little Lambs

Time: 5 Minutes

Gather the children into a circle and ask them a specific question about what they learned during Little Lambs. (i.e., Ask them what a shepherd does and why we sometimes call Jesus the Good Shepherd.) Close with a circle prayer. (For an explanation of circle prayer, see Good-baa Little Lambs Meeting 1.)

Time: 5 to 10 Minutes

You'll need one 12 x 18 inch piece of construction paper for each child. On each sheet of paper, draw a tree trunk and grass.

You Will Need:

- 12 x 18 inch sheets of construction paper
- Green tempera or fingerpaint
- Shallow containers for the paint (i.e., plastic disposable plates)
- Crayons or markers
- Newspapers
- Oversized shirts or plastic trash bags to use as smocks

Then draw a large circle atop of the tree trunk. This is the area the children will fill in with handprints to represent leaves. Pour enough green tempera or finger paint to cover the bottom of a shallow container (disposable plastic plates work well). Cover the area where the children will be painting with newspaper. (Don't worry if the "leaves" are all over the picture and not in the circle.) After the children have put the leaves on their trees, have an adult ask the children the names of their family members and then print the names on the leaves. (The children may not know proper names of their family, so it's okay to write Grammy, Mommy, or Daddy.) Don't forget to include the child's name on one of the leaves. And if they want to try to write their own name, let them!

Next, fill additional bowls with foods with the following scents: vanilla, vinegar, an orange, cinnamon and ginger. Finally, fill bowls with foods with a variety of textures: spaghetti, jello, dry oatmeal and peeled grapes. On separate sheets of paper write taste and draw a mouth, write smell and draw a nose, and write touch and draw a hand. If we

draw a nose, and write touch and draw a hand. (If you can't draw, use pictures from magazines.)

Directions


Directions

This Iranian children's game may be similar to games played when Jesus was a boy.

Have the children sit in a circle. Have an adult lightly pull the hair of the player on his or her right. The player on the leader's right repeats the action on his or her neighbor to the right. The action continues around the circle until it comes back to the adult who then starts another action around the circle. Suggested actions: a funny face, a light poke in the ribs, an easy tug on the ear or nose. Traditionally, any player that laughed, giggled or make a sound of any kind was out. The winner was the one that showed the most control. You can have the children try not to laugh but it may be too difficult for some kids. So just let them have a good time copying the actions of the leader.

Maracas – The Carribean & Brazil: Percussion instruments that you shake. Give child two 8-ounce empty water bottles with lids. Fill with a teaspoon or two of popcorn, beans, rice or small stones.

Stamping Sticks – Fiji & Australia: Percussion instrument that you bang on the floor (not carpet).

Strong cardboard tubes, 2 to 3 feet long - tubes used to mail posters work well or the cores from carpet rolls. *TIP*: A local carpet store is good place to begin looking for sturdy tubes. Before giving the tubes to the children, cover one end with a few layers of duct tape. This is the end that is hit against the floor. Decorate the tubes with paint or stickers.

culture, too. Some of your Little Lambs may already know some hand clapping songs that they can share with the group or you can challenge them with some new ones. If you don't know any hand clap games, check out *Miss Mary Mack: A Hand-Clapping Rhyme* (2003) by Mary Ann Hoberman and Nadine Bernard Westcott. The hand clap rhymes you pick may need to be simplified for children this age. *TIP*: Type up the words and directions to each hand clap song to share with the adults at your meeting.

Directions

Teach the children the following (or one you already know) hand clap rhyme:

Double, Double

Double double this that, Double double that that, Double this, double that, Double double this that.

Clapping directions for Double, Double

Hold your hands up, with fingers pointing to the ceiling. As you say the rhyme, turn your hands back and forth. When you say double, your palms face you, when you say this that, your palms face away from you. Each time you repeat the rhyme chant it a bit faster, until the children dissolve into a giggling heap! Or you can clap your hands together for each syllable of double and clap the palms of a partner for this that. Additionally, you can substitute any two syllable word for this that (i.e. pizza, cup cakes, ice cream.)

Don't forget to make small air holes in the bottles! *TIP:* If you aren't too excited about catching your own insects or you live in a bug free area, stop by a pet or bait shop. They are a good source for live bugs, especially crickets. Place enlarged pictures of the insects next to the bottles.

Directions

Have the children observe the bugs. Provide magnifying glasses for an extra close look.



SCIENCE ACTIVITY

Time: 10 Minutes

Meets requirement 2 of Weather Star

Before You Begin

Find pictures of icebergs, clouds and rain to place around this activity center. You'll also need to locate some desk lamps. Ask friends and family to save plastic liter bottles. You'll need one for each child. Make a sample rain gauge ahead of time.

Directions

ACTIVITY 1 - Place ice cubes in a bowl with a little water. Place a bright light (a desk lamp works well) near the bowl and have the children observe what happens to the water when the ice cubes melt.

ACTIVITY 2 - Have the children place a cotton ball into water and then squeeze the water out. Then place the cotton ball into a plastic baggie and seal the bag. Place the baggie near a bright, warm lamp (put not so close the bag melts). Encourage the children to use a magnifying glass to watch for the drops of water that appear.

ACTIVITY 3 - Give each child a 2 liter plastic pop bottle with the top 3 or 4 inches cut off and a plastic ruler. Have the children put craft glue on the back of the ruler and then attach the ruler vertically inside the plastic bottle. Now they have their own rain gauge to take home and measure the rain.




Before You Begin

Create a large game on the floor. Depending on how many Little Lambs are in your club, you may want to make more than one game. You'll need a center row of yellow circles (8 inch diameter) and about 20 red and blue circles (8 inch diameter). Place the all of the red circles on one side of the yellow row of circles in 4 by 5 lines and the blue on the other side. 
If your program is part of an Adventurer Club, your Little Lambs will participate in the Club Investiture. Make sure that the Little Lamb pledge and song are included in the program.
